

2019-2020 University Senate Leadership Election Campaign Statements

Executive Committee – Chair

Jon Oliver, New Brunswick Staff

I am asking your consideration for my candidacy as chair of the University Senate. It has been my honor to serve as vice chair these past two years and I hope to continue my service to you in this new role. I have served on the Senate since 2008, co-chair and subsequently chair of the University Structure and Governance Committee since 2009, Senate Parliamentarian since 2016 and a member of the Executive Committee since 2013. In the past two years, I have attended all 16 Senate meetings thus far and all 16 Executive Committee meetings, (100% attendance for both).

I would be honored and humbled if you entrust the chair to me and will work every day to be worthy of that confidence and trust. Executive Committee – Vice Chair

Peter Gillett, RBS:UNB (F)

I am asking for your vote as Vice Chair of the University Senate. I have previously served on the *Executive Committee* for nine years, the last three years as your Chair, and I now hope to have the opportunity to extend my service to you all. Here is some background:

1. After working at all levels including partner in two international accounting firms, I returned to academia, obtained my PhD, and joined the faculty of the *Rutgers Business School–Newark and New Brunswick* in 1996. I have taught and worked both in New Brunswick (where my current office is located) and in Newark (where my School is based). I have been an active member of the Senate for five terms, working on the *University Structure and Governance Committee* (as Chair or Co-Chair for five years) and on the *Budget and Finance Committee*. I have recently been re-elected to serve a sixth term. On *USGC*, I presented resolutions to increase staff representation on Senate, to preserve student representation through reorganization in New Brunswick, and to rebalance the size and composition of the Senate. I also worked with my committee on significant resolutions relating to the Vagelos report, the reorganization of undergraduate education in NB, the formation of a new nursing school in Camden, the preservation of Camden's place within Rutgers, enhanced shared governance at Rutgers, management of Senate business, etc. I followed Paul Panayotatos as Chair of the Senate's *Ad-Hoc Committee on Shared Governance*. On *Budget and Finance*, I spearheaded a prior year review of the University Budget. For the three years prior to being Chair, I served as the University Senate Parliamentarian. I have been proud and privileged to serve as your Vice Chair and Chair in the past three years, and to represent Rutgers at meetings of the Shared Governance organizations of the other CIC members.
2. Beyond the Senate, I have served on the *NB Faculty Council* and its Curriculum Committee, and am the Faculty Advisor to the *Rutgers University Glee Club* and *Kirkpatrick Choir*. I have been elected to serve a eighth term as Faculty Secretary and Chair of the Committee on Rules of Procedure of the Rutgers Business School, served on multiple other committees, coordinated our PhD program for five years, and for two years was Academic Director of the *Prudential Business Ethics Center*.
3. My three children, my son-in-law, and my daughter-in-law-elect, all graduated from Rutgers, giving me considerable experience as a Rutgers parent, and insights into student life, educational costs, organizational challenges, and the infamous RU Screw.
4. My contributions as Chair, I believe, have been the ability both to see the big picture and to attend to small but significant details; steadfast refusal to put popularity ahead of the need to speak truth and do right as I see them; rich experience of committee work both within Rutgers and in the business community; wide-ranging commitment to Rutgers, to the Senate, and to shared governance; determination to do what I can to help make Rutgers the best university it can be, for everyone; detailed working knowledge of technology and accounting; and a British sense of humor (which I clearly need . . .). Apparently, however, I do lack brevity. Sorry. I have greatly enjoyed my work on Senate so far, and learned a great deal from it, especially about collaborative work and about how Rutgers functions. It has been my privilege to serve as your Chair for the last three years, during which the Senate did many things I am proud of – for which credit is mostly due to Senators, especially active committee members. I had some small hand in a statement on “Rutgers – A Safe and Welcoming Environment,” in codifying our parliamentary procedures, and in starting meetings on time!

5. My passions now are to promote effective shared governance at Rutgers, and to play the most productive role I personally can in making Rutgers the best place to live, learn, study, research, work, grow, develop, and serve that it can possibly be.
6. Because Senator Cotter stepped up to serve as my predecessor's Vice Chair when Chair Panayatas passed away, I served only one year as Chair Gould's Vice Chair. In offering my services now to assist the next Chair, I am therefore intending both to emulate Senator Cotter's service model and to make my experience available to the new Chair and Executive Committee on an ongoing basis.

In accordance with the requirements of Recommendation 2 in report S-1501, I report my attendance record for the past two years as follows: I have been a member of the Budget & Finance Committee for both years, and have attended all but one of its monthly meetings (on which occasion I had to attend to other duties as Chair of the Senate). With one meeting yet to come this year, there have been 17 Senate Meetings so far in the past two years, 100% of which I have attended; in addition, there have been 16 Executive Committee meetings, 100% of which I have attended.

I shall greatly appreciate your vote and look forward to serving you and our institution once more as we work together on our second magnificent and revolutionary 250 years!

I earned my doctorate in American Politics at the George Washington University and have been with the Eagleton Institute of Politics since 2006. In addition to being a Rutgers faculty member, I currently am a Rutgers parent – my daughter is a student of Douglass Residential College and is completing her first year.

The mission of Eagleton is to link the study of politics with the practice of politics. The emphasis on linking the theoretical with the practical is reflected in my approach to teaching, service, and scholarship. As a professor, I seek to extend my students' learning outside the classroom and offer them meaningful experiential learning opportunities. For example, students' understanding of youth political participation is enhanced by working on our RU Voting effort to register and mobilize Rutgers students or our RU Ready civic engagement initiative administered in New Brunswick High School.

My scholarship reflects my interest in blending the theoretical with the practical. Most recently, I served as lead editor of Teaching Civic Engagement Across the Disciplines published by the American Political Science Association (APSA) and edit the text's companion website. My 2017 book Citizen Now: Engaging in Politics and Democracy reviews and critiques existing research on youth political engagement and offers a fresh perspective on youth engagement grounded in their experiences. I've played an active and leading role in organizing APSA's "Teaching and Learning Conference" and am co-chair of the Political Science Education Division for the 2019 Annual Meeting of the American Political Science Association.

I've greatly enjoyed my time as a member of the Rutgers University Senate and co-chair of the Student Affairs Committee and have learned a great deal. In many ways, my time as a Senator has provided me with the experiential learning I try to offer my students. As Rutgers faculty and now a Rutgers parent, I'm proud to be a part of the State University of New Jersey and would be honored to represent my peers as a member of the Executive Committee in service to the University.

I am honored to be a nominee for the RBHS Faculty Member of the Executive committee next year. My back ground includes 50+ years as a student, resident, and now faculty member at the same medical school that I graduated from in 1971. During this time, I served as Medical Director of the FXB Center for Children, one of the nation's largest treatment and clinical trials centers for childhood HIV/AIDS and the Center for Laboratory Immunology. Despite extensive and diversified research, much of this work over the past 40 years, focused on both prevention and treatment for Perinatal HIV/AIDS infection in infants, children and adolescents in US and underserved International countries as well as teaching/mentoring medical students and resident in the practice and care of child with both acute and chronic illnesses. I have also served as a NJMS faculty representative to the RBHS Senate since its inception and have also served on the executive committee during this time. As a member of the Budget and Finance Committee, I have worked with the committee's ongoing efforts to analyze the university

budget. I have also collaborated with other members of student government to do research into the term bill fee structure at Rutgers, and at the request of the Chair, I anticipate presenting these findings to the committee in the fall. In addition to my work in the Senate, I served as a member of the Executive Board for the RBS undergraduate student government (RBGA), as well as the Parliamentarian for the Rutgers University Student Assembly (RUSA), the campus-wide student government in which I worked to revise the standing rules and committee structure, draft a permanent elections code, and increase the level of transparency involved in the process by which RUSA allocates funding to student organizations, among other projects.

As the New Brunswick Student Member on the Executive Committee, I would like to work to increase accessibility by helping students bring charges to the Executive Committee and by advocating for the New Brunswick student constituency. Moreover, I would like to incorporate in my reports to the Senate information about more student governments at Rutgers. Often, the reports of the New Brunswick Student Executive Committee Member contain information about RUSA, but not the graduate student governing associations, or the professional school student governments. During my time on the banks, I have had the privilege of working with amazing student leaders from different student governments, and I would like to use these connections to better report on student business, which has been helpful to the Senate in the past. For example, a report on sustainability at the University drafted in RUSA has recently been referenced by two Senate Committees in connection with their charges. However, I also feel like this reporting cannot be one way, and if I am elected to this position, I would make a more concerted effort at reporting back on Senate business to different student leaders on campus; and hopefully, this would promote more participation by constituencies which do not frequently send their Senators.

Additionally, I would like to work with training for new Student Senators, continuing the work of this year's NB Student Executive Committee Member. Because students serve one-year terms in the Senate, they do not have the same level of experience as faculty members who have been in the Senate for twenty years. Training could help Student Senators better acclimate themselves to the Senate and to its committees, by allowing for a more comprehensive understanding of the Senate and how it operates. In fact, I ran similar training programs in RUSA and RBGA to help members better understand the history and structure of student government, how those bodies operate, and how to be comfortable using parliamentary procedure during debate. This is in line with the recommendations proposed by the Student Affairs Committee in response to Charge S-1804 and the efforts of the Executive Secretary of the Senate, and I would certainly like to aid in this process in any way that I can.

Furthermore, I would like to propose more charges that effectively use the University Senate's role in shared governance with respect to key University policies and practices. For example, while the Budget and Finance Committee has conducted annual reviews and reports on the budget, I think it is important that the committee investigate the budgeting priorities of the University. Moreover, as many Senators may recall, the Senate was not initially consulted prior to the adoption of the recent changes to the Code of Conduct. This not only impacts students, but all members of the Rutgers community, and it is imperative that the Senate make its voice heard on those types of policy matters. Finally, I would like to work to increase collaboration with other constituencies in the Senate. Frequently, it seems like the student senators are isolated, and while they have sizable representation in the Student Affairs Committee, they are thinly spread amongst the rest of the committees. I remember one instance in which a faculty member asked the former chair of the Student Affairs Committee for information about the committee's business because many faculty members apparently had little idea of what the committee was doing.

I would like to thank all of you for your consideration. It has been a pleasure to work with you, and I hope you will give me the honor to serve in this capacity during my final year at Rutgers.
